It is a proud moment for me to be a part of Duchess of Kent Children's Hospital, Paediatric Orthopedics team from January to June 2018. I am from Pakistan, which is the sixth most densely populated country in the world. In our country our residency program is only related to general orthopedics and during my training what I realize is that there are many paediatrics patients with deformities especially, DDH, cerebral palsy, polio etc. who are not treated properly. This motivated me to get proper training in paediatric orthopedics and start dedicated paediatric orthopedics services in my country. I consider my self-lucky enough to be selected as clinical associate at Duchess of Kent Children's Hospital.



I arrived in Hong Kong in early January 2018. I was slightly nervous and little bit anxious in my heart because it was my first visit to Hong Kong. Miss May was kind enough, she was guiding me all the time regarding how to reach my residential quarter. The next day she oriented me regarding my job and she remained very cooperative during my training here. I was very surprised to see that every person in the hospital worked so efficiently.

I have seen many paediatric patients with various pathologies like DDH, osteogenesis imperfecta, cerebral palsy, foot anomalies, Perthes disease, slipped capital femoral epiphysis etc. during the start of my training I was totally lost and was unable to understand certain things. It was pleasure working and learning with them both during the past six months. During my stay Dr. Anderson qualified FRCS and we celebrated together. And I wish for Dr. Justin's fellowship qualification soon. I wish them both success in their careers and in life.
