The program emphasizes an approach that allows fellows to actively participate in patient care, surgical procedures, and clinical decision-making. I was able to perform ward rounds, assist in surgeries and do out-patient consults with the supervision and guidance of my mentors.


Weekly Schedule and Activities

Tuesday



At first, I get to observe the consultants in performing detailed history taking, comprehensive physical assessment, analysis of radiographs and clinical decision making during clinic sessions. After getting the hang of it, I was able to do consultations on my own. The consultants are very approachable. They are nearby and ready to discuss cases and answer my questions.



Out-patient clinic setting. A consultation room is provided where I can access the digital patient records and perform consultation.


Sometimes, translators are available. But if that was not possible, English-speaking patients are chosen or I get to do consultations together with other trainees who can speak the local language.

Grand Rounds at DKCH were held at 2pm on Tuesdays. I endorse the patients admitted, post-op patients and pre-op patients for next week. The whole team is usually present to discuss the theoretical and clinical aspects of the cases. We get to see and examine patients together.

Wednesday



This is the Kwun Tong Promenade where I usually walk by to get from MTR station to HKCH. I just chose to have my morning walk along this scenic bay side but one can take a minibus from train station to the hospital.


HKCH out-patient clinic where we spend most of the Wednesday afternoons.




Dr. Kuong as a speaker at the 20th Hong Kong International Orthopedic Forum.
